

The University Library administration have many achievements or accomplished tasks this School Year 2022 in spite of hectic schedules with the help of my energetic and hard-working support staff, the Academic Council Library Committee members, the administration headed by Dr. Sema G. Dilna, our University President and above all with the help of our almighty Allah. First, the renaming and revision of University Library Manual of Operation was successfully approved by the Board of Regents with Board Resolution No. 04, series of 2022. Second, the proposed library fee increase of Php150.00 with the total of Php300.00 for every student was approved and implemented this first semester of School Year 2022-2023 with Board Resolution No.013, series of 2022. Third, the administration headed by Prof. Sema G. Dilna allotted the University Library for Two million five hundred thousand budgets (2,500,000.00) intended for upgrading library collections from fiduciary fund of Library in which we acquired 654 book titles with 1,479 volumes. 



The table above shows the enrollment data of the university registrar for the academic year 2021–2022. The University Registrar recorded 10,331 enrollees in the first semester and 9,908 in the second semester, for 20,239 enrollees. The highest number of enrollees was obtained by the Baccalaureate Program, with 7,962 enrollees for the first semester and 7,806 enrollees for the second semester. The second highest number of enrollees was garnered by the Master's Degree Program, with 1,033 enrollees for the first semester and 913 for the second semester.

The third-highest enrollment program was gained by the senior high school department of the university laboratory school, with a total number of 505 enrollees for the first semester and 445 enrollees for the second semester.

The fourth-highest enrollment program was obtained by the junior high school department of the university laboratory school, with 557 enrollees for the first semester and 497 enrollees for the first semester. Moreover, the doctoral degree program accumulated the lowest number of enrollees, with 274 enrollees for the first semester and 247 enrollees for the second semester.

Finally, there were a total of 1,762 graduates of Cotabato State University to wit: 1,621 graduates for the Baccalaureate Program, 189 graduates for the senior high school department of the university laboratory school,124 graduates for the Master's Degree Program, 97 graduates for the junior high school department of the university and 17 graduates for the doctoral degree program.





The ORP conducted a Planning Write-Shop Cum Coaching, Mentoring, and Packaging of Research Proposals purposely to empower and capacitate CSU faculty researchers for quality research and publication; develop innovative research and apply appropriate tools for the proposed study; and package research proposals of the faculty researchers ready for in-house review.

CONDUCTED PLANNING-WRITESHOP CUM COACHING, MENTORING, AND PACKAGING OF RESEARCH PROPOSALS

In addition, universities must have resource mobilization strategies in place in order to properly mobilize resources. Quality control, packaging, and marketing of the university as an investment destination by various types of funders should be established through university operations and systems for resource mobilization and administration. Furthermore, the faculty should be capable of writing high-quality research proposals that can be sponsored by development partners and other private sources. Management of partnerships, quality control, timely reporting, and transparent financial management and reporting are all important aspects of keeping the university a top investment destination.



Furthermore, mentorship is important for early-stage investigators' success, and it has been associated to increased mentee productivity, self-efficacy, and job happiness (Sorkness et al., 2016). All scientists have a professional responsibility to mentor a less-experienced researcher. The mentor's ultimate purpose is to help the trainee become an independent researcher. Mentoring roles include sharing knowledge and abilities, overseeing the trainee's work, assisting with career advice, and assisting with the trainee's communication with other researchers (APA).

CONDUCTED AN IN-HOUSE REVIEW OF THE RESEARCH PROPOSALS

As one of the State Universities and Colleges (SUCs) four-fold functions, the Research Office is mandated to strengthen the University's research undertakings and engagement.

To achieve the university's vision, mission, goals and thrusts, the Office of the Research Programs (ORP) has been conducting In-House Reviews regularly to ensure maximum participation of the faculty in the research arena.

Dr. Sema G. Dilna, the CSU President, encouraged his faculty to go for a process of proper scrutiny and evaluation of research to be scientifically and scholarly done and make research a passion of the university. 

As of December 2022, Cotabato State University has 188 faculty members holding plantilla positions.

The majority of the faculty holds an instruction position (94), followed by assistant professors (50), while the rest are associate professors (39). As shown in the table, there is one (1) Professor V, three (3) Professors III, and one (1) Professor II.

Further, there are nine (9) Associate Professor V, six (5) Associate Professor IV, 11 Associate Professor III, eight (8) Associate Professor II, and six (6) Associate Professor I. Moreover, there are eight (8) assistant professors IV, 14 assistant professors III, 11 assistant professors II, and 17 assistant professors I. Lastly, there are 12 Instruction III, eight (6) Instruction II, and 76 Instruction I.

Faculty Profile Based on Educational Attainment

The University faculty members have continuously grown professionally. The Human Resource Management Office records at least 34 percent or 63 PhD holders. In addition, 58 percent, or 109 faculty members, had master's degrees, and 8 percent, or 16 members, had baccalaureate degrees.

HIGHLIGHTS : ACCOMPLISHMENTS Cotabato State University Personnel

Cotabato State University has a total of 452 employees. Compared to last year's 410, this is an increased number of 42 personnel. Aside from the 188 regular faculty, there are 73 existing job-order faculty who have been distributed among the six colleges, and 29 have been stationed at the Laboratory High School.

Likewise, there are currently 40 people employed as regular administrative staff at the college. In addition, there are recorded 119 job orders for administrative staff and 3 plantilla contractual faculty with the total of 452 CSU personnel.

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Programs and Projects Implemented



One of the initiative of the Health Services Office to increase the immunity of the students and personnel of Cotabato State University against COVID-19 is an inoculation program. In coordination with the Cotabato City Office on Health Services and Rural Health Unit from Barangay Rosary Heights 4, a total of 21 individuals have received their booster dose against COVID-19 Infection at CSU-Health Services Office.

A total of Ten (10) boxes of COVID-19 Rapid Test Device has been received from the Cotabato City Health Office on October 11, 2022. This test device will help the University Health Services Office in surveillance and detection activity of students, teaching and non-teaching personnel with COVID-19-like signs and symptoms.





A total of 103 students who will participate in the Mindanao Association of State Tertiary School under Socio-Cultural Affairs has been examined by DR. MARCELITO B. CARAGAY, the visiting physician and has certified the students physically fit to participate in their chosen event.

In celebration of National World HIV/ AIDS month and campaign on VAW-C awareness, the Health Services Office in partnership with the Gender and Development Office conducted an awareness seminar on Sexually Transmitted Infection, participants were selected faculty members and Local Student Government from different department of this institution. Caragay, who is also the current Medical Consultant of the university and the HIV/AIDS Treatment Hub Physician of Cotabato Sanitarium and General Hospital.



GENERAL SERVICES OFFICE




The GSO office is mandated to provide an excellent service management of the University's property, general sanitation and solid waste program of the Institution.

The GSO office has submitted PPMP as the guide in utilizing to purchase office equipment's and supplies.




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In coordination with the supply and management office, the GSO conducted waste disposal for the unserviceable Materials.

For the Maintenance and Other Operating Expenses (MOOE), 41.32% is appropriated and 3.45% for Capital Outlay (CO) respectively.

The Statement of Appropriations, Allotments, Obligations, Disbursements, and Balances (FAR No. 1) as of December 31, 2022, shows that the University has a total allotment received amounting to Two Hundred twenty-Eight Million One Hundred Ninety Thousand Four Hundred Eight Pesos (P228,192,408.00) including RLIP & PGF.

Frontloading of PS allotment was requested due to PS deficiency. This was due to the exclusion of the University in the FY2022 National Expenditures Program, wherein, only the Tier 1 level of the budget for Personnel Services were considered in the FY2022 General Appropriations Act. PS utilization rate is 100%.

For the MOOE, allotment released is 74.17% from the appropriation. The unreleased appropriation constitutes the Free Higher Education–24.88%, 4.73% for Student Assistance Program, 4.73% for Conduct of Activities for Sports and Culture Development. Utilization is 100% of the allotment released. For the unreleased appropriation, it will become a continuing appropriation for Fiscal Year 2023.

For Later Release projects under MOOE are the following:

Of these for Later Release locally funded projects, 100% of the allotment for Capacity Development for Futures, Thinking and Foresight has been released, 49.15% for Free Higher Education while the others are still on process.

The Capital Outlay for FY2022 the Infrastructure and Smart Campus Development, Operationalization of Face-to-Face Classes, and Upgrading/Procurement of Equipment is considered as for Later Release, wherein, we are required to submit special budgetary requests with supporting documents to the Department of Budget and Management (DBM).

For Continuing Obligation of Locally Funded Projects from Capital Outlay, actual disbursement is only 34.11% of the total obligations. To date, 1 project is 100% completed while the other locally funded projects from Fiscal Years 2020 and 2021 are still ongoing. The minimal turn-out of physical accomplishment is due to the late commencement of project construction because of limited movements brought about by the health pandemic.

Income Performance – FAR 5

Based on the submitted Report of Revenue and other Receipts (FAR 5) as of December 31, 2022, the University generated receipts/research grants/scholarship grants/ collections amounting to One Hundred Forty-Six Million Nine Hundred Forty-Three Thousand Five Hundred Fifty-Seven Pesos and 53/100 (P 146,943,557.53). This amount consists of Tuition and Other School Fees-40.49%, Research grants–20.99%, Scholarship grants – 19.04%, Revolving fund-18.66% and IGP– .82%.

CASHIER OFFICE

One of the key units of the University is the Cashier's Office. The Office is responsible for carrying out tasks related to the collection of internally generated funds/school fees, downloading of salaries, wages, honoraria, and other forms of compensation to government-authorized depository banks, and preparation of obligations to suppliers and other creditors. The Office is also responsible for the sorting of paid vouchers, and the preparation and submission of reports as mandated by the government regulating body. Cashier's Office has two functions, Collection and Disbursement. The collection Section is manned by the Collecting Officers who solely collect and issue Official Receipts upon receipt of internally generated funds. The Collecting Officers are also responsible for the preparation of the Daily Cash Receipt Register, Remittance of Daily Collections, and Report of Accountability for Accountable Forms based on the Official Receipts issued. The Disbursement Section's responsibilities are the preparation of checks issued and canceled, releasing of checks, preparation of LDDAP-ADA, report of disbursements, and sorting out of paid vouchers to be submitted to the Commission on Audit and Accounting Office.

HIGHLIGHTS : ACCOMPLISHMENTS A. Collection Tuition Fees and Miscellaneous Fees

This is the frontline service of the University Cashier's office which is served by the collecting officers. The collection starts from 8:00 AM up to 4:00 PM as the cut-off time. For Laboratory High School, the collections are made under the control of one collector.

The collection system is made more convenient as the statement of account can be accessed through the computer-generated SIMONE enrolment system. Enrolment for the 2nd semester of the academic year 2021-2022 was completed in a span of 2 to 3 weeks. For the 1st semester of the academic year 2022-2023, the enrolment was completed in five weeks.

For the summer of AY2021–2022, the collections lasted for 2 weeks. The students were scheduled according to their year levels. Each collector was assigned to respective year levels. All collections were deposited every last working day of the month to avoid undeposited amounts reflected in the succeeding month.

The Collecting Officers see to it that outstanding accounts of old students should be collected most especially students with back accounts wherein SIMONE system was not yet implemented during the years 2015 and below. This is considered as other income of the school.

The everyday collection is deposited the following day in an authorized government depository bank. Deposit Slips are attached to the documentary support of the collections which includes the daily cash register, breakdown of collections, and duplicate copies of the official receipts for verification and the signature of the Cashier.

A total of 51,500 Official Receipts with RP seal 51-C and 20,000 Personalized Official Receipts were delivered and received from the National Printing Office for Fiscal Year 2022.

Income Generating Project and Other Income/Receipts

A collecting officer is in charge of the collection of the Income Generating Projects. Proper details of the collection are being observed to monitor the outstanding balances of the different projects.

Cash returns from unspent cash advances, disallowances, etc. are properly issued with official receipts and deposited to government-authorized depository banks.

Fund transfers intended for various projects such as research, scholarships, and other grants from the Commission on Higher Education are properly documented and monitored.

For the Fiscal Year 2022, total generated receipts/collections amounted to One Hundred Forty-Six Million Nine Hundred Forty-Three Thousand Five Hundred Fifty-Seven Pesos and 53/100 (P 146,943,557.53).

B. Disbursement Payments thru Checks and ADA

This is the primary mode of payment of the College. Checks are serially issued according to Fund Sources charged by the Budget office. If it is NCA, the Land Bank of the Philippines check booklet is being used. For Trust Fund, the Development of the Philippines CCSPC account as well as the Land Bank current account is utilized. Same with the Graduate School which had two existing authorized deposit banks, the DBP and LBP. For the Laboratory High School and Income Generating Projects, DBP accounts for LHS and IGP accounts, respectively, have been issued.

List of Due and Demandable Obligations-Advice to Debit Account (LDDAP- ADA) are being used for payments that can be paid through their savings or current account with LBP. This is to save up the utilization of LBP checks and also to ease the release of payments instead of checks.

Before each check or ADA together with supporting documents is released to the office of the Internal Control Unit, they are supported with Advice of Check Issued and Cancelled that served as the master list of the checks or ADA being issued. Manual checks advice is used for both LBP and DBP accounts.

One employee is being assigned to the preparation of the Advice of Checks Issued and Cancelled and another staff to the recording and releasing of checks based upon its fund cluster. A liaison officer is being designated to do the task of payments of mandatory remittances such as GSIS, PhilHealth, and PAG-IBIG; payments of utility services such as electricity, water, and an internet connection to various private companies; and sending off the payments for salaries to the government servicing banks.

Payments Thru Petty Cash Fund

The Petty Cash Fund is made for the payments of authorized or miscellaneous expenses which cannot be conveniently paid through checks. This is controlled under the custody of the Special Disbursing officer or the Cashier. The fund is monitored through the imprest system. The existing amount of the petty cash fund is P30,000.00.

The Designated Acting Cashier recorded a total of ninety-seven (97) Petty Cash Vouchers paid and processed four (4) replenishments from July 21, 2022, up to this writing.

C. Reporting Commission of Audit

The Reports of Collections and Deposits (RCD) and Report of Accountability for Accountable Forms (RAAF) are submitted monthly at the end of every month. Copies of the deposit slips are also attached together with the monthly bank statements. The reports are submitted to the Commission on Audit Office thru the Office of the Internal Control Unit and Office of the Accounting Unit.

The Reports of Checks Issued (RCI) are also prepared and submitted monthly .The disbursement vouchers, budget utilization requests, and supporting documents are sorted out into 3 copies. Original copies to COA, duplicate copies maintained by the Cash office, and triplicate copies for the custody of the Accounting office. Other reports as required by COA and the Accounting Office are complied with as soon as they need it.

Bureau of Treasury

Submission of the Reports of Accountability and Accountable Forms (RAAF) has complied with monthly.

The Fidelity Bonds of the accountable officers are also monitored to periodically renew them before expiration lapses. Additional officers are also applying for a bond this year.

Online application of fidelity bonds is implemented by the Treasury, hence application is thru online only.
